

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

10AM, Wednesday, April16th, 2008

Coffee was available at 9:30AM, and a light lunch was served following the meeting.

1. Call to order

Task Force Co-Chairs Don Shanis of DVRPC and Eric Madden of PennDOT called the quarterly freight advisory committee meeting to order. All Task Force members were recognized, new attendees were welcomed, and the January 16th, 2008 meeting notes (which were emailed to the committee members prior to the meeting) were approved by the committee.

Later in the meeting, Denise Pyers, PennDOT's newly appointed Bureau Director of Rail Freight, Ports, and Waterways, was recognized.

2. Rating the Region: The State of the Delaware Valley

Mary Bell of DVRPC presented the findings of the Commission's *Rating the Region* report which updates the 1993 report of the same title, and provides an objective, quantifiable analysis of the relative strengths and weaknesses of the Delaware Valley Region.

The report compares 13 metropolitan areas in terms of human environment, economy, transportation, and civic environment. Some of the regional strengths that were identified in the report include: a strong healthcare network, many colleges and universities, low crime rate, high educational attainment, relatively less congestion, shorter commutes, and a higher percentage of homeowners. Perhaps the biggest strength is that the Philadelphia Metropolitan Area boasts the most diverse economy of any of the areas studied. Some challenges that emerged from the report were the gap between cities and suburbs in terms of most categories assessed, and the aging regional population.

3. Creating a Vision for the Central Delaware River Waterfront

Harris Steinburg, FAIA, founding Executive Director of PennPraxis, presented an overview of the planning process and key elements of *A Civic Vision for the Central*

Delaware. The limits of the study area extended along the Delaware River from Oregon Avenue to Allegheny Avenue. Although the study area did not directly cover major port areas, Task Force member Nicholas Walsh of PRPA and others met with the study team to discuss port activity and expansion plans.

The key elements of the project are an extension of Philadelphia's signature street grid to the waterfront, as well as the creation of an open space interconnected network of over 1,100 acres of former industrial land along the central waterfront. It is believed that this approach will spur future private development in a economically beneficial and environmentally sustainable pattern.

This planning effort generated significant interest and discussion. Thousands of people attended the many public meetings which helped shape the vision.

4. City Avenue Revitalization

Terry Foley, a long-time friend of the committee from his years at PRPA, presented the City Avenue Revitalization Plan. Mr. Foley is now the President and CEO of the CityAve Special Services District. The plan focuses on economic revitalization of the corridor along City Avenue in Philadelphia and Lower Merion, as well as the surrounding area.

The corridor is the region's center for the television and radio industries, hosts 2 colleges, and contains a very strong commercial district. The revitalization plan focuses on three critical elements: a zoning overlay, a new streetscape, and a safety capital improvement program.

5. A National View of Freight Transportation

Kate Quinn, Team Leader for Federal Highway Administration's Office of Freight Management and Operations, presented a snapshot of freight flows in the United States. Nationally, freight shipments are expected to nearly double through 2035, while they are forecasted to have much more than a doubling in terms of value. These trends are expected to lead to at least a doubling of truck trips. In terms of congestion, 11% of the National Highway System is estimated to currently experience congestion, while in 2035 that number is forecasted to grow to 40%.

Ms. Quinn also spoke about the Truck Speed and Reliability data that is currently being collected by FHWA. More than 300,000 trucks are being tracked to determine the average truck speeds on the National Highway System. This will better allow them to determine where bottlenecks that affect reliability exist. Ms. Quinn's office is also involved in the Corridors of the Future program, of which I-95 is one.

This overview of freight trends is helpful to decision makers, planners, and the public in understanding the magnitude and importance of freight transportation in the economy. It also serves as a prelude to a commodity flow analysis for the Philadelphia Consolidated Statistical Area being prepared by DVRPC staff which will be presented at the July meeting.
