- TIP AMENDMENT
- ► **ACTION:** Increase the CON phase by \$12,552,000 (FY20: \$2,295,000 STU; FY21: \$9,205,000 STU; FY22: 1,052,000 STU)
- ▶ Reason: To cover winning bid for the new District 6-0 RTMC
- Background:
  - Involves construction of new RTMC and parking structure on existing PennDOT 6-0 office property in King of Prussia
  - Design-build contract issued by the Department of General Services (DGS); PennDOT will lead technical requirements
  - Due to DGS confidentiality requirements, specific cost breakdowns are not available



- ▶ **ACTION:** Draw funds down from Regional Safety Initiatives (HSIP) line item for a total of \$13,455,000 HSIP
  - PE in FY19 (\$855,000 HSIP)
  - FD in FY19 (\$2,800,000 HSIP)
  - ROW in FY20 (\$1,500,000 HSIP)
  - UTL in FY20 (\$800,000 HSIP)
  - CON in FY23 (\$7,500,000 HSIP); and
  - Change scope to include a roundabout at the PA 896 and PA 841 intersection
- Reason: Reduce crashes and related injuries along PA 896 between Elbow Lane in London Britain Township and Shepherd Lane in New London Township


### Swamp Pike over Minister Creek Bridge (CB #172)

Montgomery County I Add New Project to TIP

- TIP AMENDMENT
- ▶ **ACTION:** Add a new \$1.77 million Act 13 funded project to the TIP, accordingly:
  - PE in FY20 (\$175,000)
  - FD in FY21 (\$175,000)
  - ROW in FY20 (\$25,000) and FY21 (\$25,000)
  - CON in FY22 (\$1,370,000)
- Reason: Replace structurally deficient, poor condition county bridge and bring it into a state of good repair
- Act 13 Marcellus Shale funds are additional to the region, distributed to counties by PennDOT based on population for the replacement or repair of locally-owned at-risk deteriorated bridges



- Two-span stone masonry arch and concrete slab bridge
- Built 1844, widened 1928
- Poor superstructure including hairline longitudinal and transverse cracking
- Bridge replacement

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



- Functionally obsolete
- Rapidly deteriorating

#### Bridge Key 10495:

- One-span reinforced concrete slab structure
- State-owned bridge on locally-owned road
- Poor condition
- Functionally obsolete
- School buses currently unable to use either bridge
- Project would replace both bridges





## What is CMAQ?

- Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ)
   Program
- Federal funds for transportation projects that will help improve air quality and reduce congestion in areas not meeting the federal health based standards for air quality



## **CMAQ Eligible Project Types**

- Congestion Reduction and Traffic Flow Improvements
- Transit Improvements
- Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities and Programs
- Travel Demand Management (TDM)
- Public Education and Outreach activities
- Freight / Intermodal
- Idle Reduction



## What is the Competitive Program?

- Open, competitive program for Pennsylvania during FY2019 to solicit and add new projects to the TIP for authorization prior to August 2024(FY24)
- \$25 million of the region's CMAQ funds set-aside
- Last round: 2016 (\$20 million set-aside)
- Changes:
  - Higher award
  - Required pre-application meeting with DVRPC
  - Online application system
  - No diesel retrofit projects
  - No purchase of advance technology or alternative fuel vehicles
  - No purchase of non-revenue fleet vehicles, with exception of SEPTA applications



### **Applications**

- Application Period: April 2, 2019 June 28, 2019
- Open to public agencies and PPP with a public agency sponsor
- Posted application and program guidance on DVRPC CMAQ website at www.dvrpc/cmaq
- Received 25 eligible applications
- Total CMAQ request: \$63.5 Million



### **Eligible Applications**

  - City of Philadelphia, PennDOT
- Municipalities
  - Lower Merion, Concord, Upper Dublin, Falls, Whitpain, Charlestown, Haverford, Marple, Perkiomen, Lower Providence, East Goshen, Lower Moreland, East Whiteland, Upper Merion, Edgmont, Lower Salford, Aston
  - Conshohocken, Phoenixville, Boroughs
- Non-profits
  - TMACC



### **Selection Process**

- Selection Committee
  - 12 Voting Members (PA RTC, PPTF, and DVRPC)
  - Reviewed, Discussed, and Scored Applications
- Selection Criteria
  - Project Readiness (25%)
  - Sponsor Capacity (25%)
  - Cost-Effectiveness (20%)
  - Long-Term Viability of Emissions Benefit (20%)
  - Environmental Justice (5%)
  - Level of Match (5%)



### **Selection Process**

- Reviewed applications
  - All projects evaluated for emissions reductions
  - Eligibility questions referred to FHWA
  - Staff provided all scores for objective criteria to reviewers
  - Averaged scores from reviewers for subjective criteria
  - Consulted with PennDOT for all roadway projects
- Selection committee made final decision

# FY20 SEPTA Work Program

Promote SEPTA Services as the Primary TDM Option in Center City Philadelphia

# Background

- Central Philadelphia Transportation Management Assn. (CPTMA) had developed a Work Program funded by the TMA Assistance Grant at \$206,375 (\$165,100 CMAQ/\$41,275 match) in FY19, and funds were committed at the same level for FY20
- After the FHWA Tier Two Review earlier this calendar year, the CPTMA decided to forfeit its funding for the current two-year contract period (FY19 and FY20)
  - This left \$174,525 unspent in FY19 and the full \$206,375 in FY20, for a total of \$380,900 (\$304,720 CMAQ/\$76,180 match) in relinquished funds

## Background, cont'd

- In order to maintain TDM coverage in Center City, oTIS, PCPC, DVRPC and PennDOT met to discuss several possible options to utilize these former CPTMA funds. The final decision was for SEPTA to develop a Work Program to educate employees working in Center City about the convenience of using transit over ride-hailing or on-demand services like uber and lyft.
- These services actually put more vehicles on city streets, which exacerbates congestion and causes more pollution. Many of SEPTA's services to and within Center City offer timely travel that rivals ride-hailing services while taking vehicles off the streets and, thus, improving AQ.

# Work Program Components

Task 1: Commuter's Choice Public Outreach Campaign

 Advertising and Social Media posts featuring the current Commuter's Choice campaign, incorporating changes with new program information brought on by KEY implementation (education on the benefits of using transit other than just for commuting, and how KEY works with the commuter benefit)

## Work Program Components, cont'd

#### Task 2: SEPTA KEY Promotion and Outreach

- Educate employees and employers in Center City about the timeline for the rollout of KEY and its functions on each type of transit service
- Use the KEY Truck as a tool to enable commuters and other employees to obtain KEY easily, and to better understand how it works so they can use transit more often (especially during work hours)
- Provide training and tutorials at SEPTA outreach events and as requested by larger employers for their employees

## Work Program Components, cont'd

#### Task 3: Digital Marketing and Educational Outreach

- Focus is to promote certain high-frequency services, as presented in a new "15-15-5" message and maps those that come every 15 minutes or less for 15 hours per day (6AM to 9PM), 5 days per week (M-F) as a less expensive and more environmentally friendly alternative to ride-hailing services in Center City
- Placement of information in digital bus shelters on hightraffic streets in CC – bus shelters can be viewed by pedestrians and vehicles, in addition to riders

## Work Program Components, cont'd

#### Task 3, cont'd:

- Paid social media posts will also be used to target select demographics and geography (employees in CC); SM allows for a more "personal" conversation with a customer and is easily monitored and measured
- Other materials to be placed as bus wraps (serve as moving billboards), bus stop educational panels, bus shelter and select El/Subway/Trolley station 15-15-5 maps, and other non-digital station ads, along with 15-15-5 brochures to be distributed at SEPTA and relevant partner events dealing with TDM and CMAQ issues

# Proposed Budget

Task 1: \$20,000 (\$16,000 CMAQ/\$4,000 match)

Task 2: \$30,000 (\$24,000 CMAQ/\$6,000 match)

Task 3: \$324,342 (\$259,474 CMAQ/\$64,868 match)

**TOTAL:** \$374,342 (299,474 CMAQ/\$74,868 match)

# Questions?

- That the Regional Technical Committee recommend Board approval of this new Work Program for promoting convenient SEPTA services in Center City that rival and can replace ride-hailing/on-demand services, thus reducing the number of vehicles on Center City streets, especially during business hours; this, in turn, helps improve the air quality in Center City and surrounding areas.
