

# **MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

10AM, Wednesday, July 16th, 2008

Coffee was available at 9:30AM, and a light lunch was served following the meeting.

#### 1. Call to order

Task Force Co-Chairs Don Shanis of DVRPC and Eric Madden of PennDOT called the quarterly freight advisory committee meeting to order. All Task Force members were recognized, new attendees were welcomed, and the April 16, 2008 meeting notes (which were emailed to the committee members prior to the meeting) were approved by the committee.

In member news, Jim Badgley was acknowledged as recently retired from New Jersey DOT after many years of outstanding service. Also, Tom Carolan and his wife just celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary.

# 2. Freight Plan Showcase

In conjunction with the 2035 long range plan update, DVRPC is organizing a freight plan showcase that will feature a guided tour of the Delaware Valley's supply chain. Ted Dahlburg described this initiative that is going to take place in the DVRPC conference room from 10AM-1PM on October 15 and which will, in effect, serve as the Task Force's quarterly meeting.

The showcase will be organized around a number of "supply chain stations" staffed by volunteers and freight experts/professionals from the Delaware Valley Goods Movement Task Force. The final station, to be staffed by DVRPC, will offer a long-range vision for the Delaware Valley's freight network and facilities and a set of capital improvements. The target audience for the exercise is the DVRPC planning community, and staff will be meeting with many of the DVRPC committees at upcoming meetings to encourage their participation.

# 3. Freight Flows and Forecasts in the Philadelphia CSA

Walker Allen presented the key findings of a DVRPC report entitled, Freight Flows and Forecasts in the Philadelphia Consolidated Statistical Area (CSA). This report contains estimates of freight flows based in year 2002 and forecasted through the year 2035, and information concerning shipment origins and destinations, commodities, and mode of travel.

Among the key findings, the study found that the value of shipments in the region is growing much faster than the weight of shipments. Also, the region is becoming increasingly consumer-based as inbound shipments are forecasted to outgrow intra-regional and outbound shipment in terms of both value and weight. The region is a hub for energy related commodities from international origins for use in the region and exported to other US regions. Trucking is the predominant mode of travel for goods in terms of weight and value and area roads will become increasingly congested. Finally, the report finds evidence of a strong interwoven fabric of freight movement within the Philadelphia CSA region as well as the Northeast Mega-Region.

# 4. Maritime Commerce in Greater Philadelphia: Assessing Trends and Growth Opportunities

The Economy League of Greater Philadelphia was commissioned by the Philadelphia Industrial Development Corporation to evaluate maritime commerce in Greater Philadelphia. Using an assessment of global trends and their implications for the region, a final report lays out growth opportunities and potential future scenarios for maritime commerce on the Delaware River.

Steve Wray of the Economy League with the help of Eric Johanson made this presentation. The report identifies current conditions of the ports and future opportunities, challenges, and limitations. The Delaware River ports have a strong advantage over other ports when it comes to niche cargos, but they are currently far below total container percentage in terms of total port activity when compared to the average world port. The local ports have a relatively small job base, providing work for roughly 12,121 workers. However these jobs have above average value. The ports total economic output is estimated at \$2.4 billion.

Advantages of the Delaware River Ports include the proximity to one of the largest consumer regions in the world; the ability to create additional land-side capacity, and efficiency in the turnover of ships. Limitations of the Delaware River Ports include: the geography which places many of facilities 100 miles from open water; the connectivity leading away from the port (e.g., doublestack rail access to the port is not highly used); and the lack of collaboration along the river as different ports compete for the same business.

### 5. Philadelphia Sports Complex Special Services District

Shawn Jalosinski, Executive Director, discussed the efforts of the Sports Complex Special Services District to protect the interests of the South Philadelphia communities it serves and to promote the efficient operation of the adjacent sports venues. Each year, the entertainment venues in South Philadelphia attract 8 million visitors.

The District offers a wide range of programs and services to the 9,000 local residents it serves. These range from traffic and parking management to sanitation and advanced event notification.

## 6. Freight Logistics Initiatives In Maryland

Ed Miller, Motor Carrier Policy Officer, described the activities of the Maryland DOT's Office of Freight Logistics. The Office of Freight Logistics champions freight, and its current activities include initiatives within Maryland and collaborative efforts with neighboring states.

Mr. Miller spoke about his office's work with the I-95 Corridor Coalition regarding the issue of truck parking and the development of a new one-week freight academy. The Coalition is currently accepting applications to the Freight Academy by the July 25<sup>th</sup> deadline.
