

40% of crashes occur at night BEFORE midnight


Cell phone use increases risk up to 4 times jeven hands free



Victim role in teen driver (15-17) fatal crashes U.S., 1998-2007




Motor vehicle crashes are the #1 cause of injury






Teens have the highest crash rates

Maximize experience / Minimize risk

Graduated Driver Licensing 3-stage system is proven to be effective in reducing fatal crashes

Stage 1

Supervised driving 12 months
Practice at nighttime and in inclement weather

Stage 2

12 months
Nighttime restriction
Passenger limit

Stage 3

Age 17 ½ or older


No cell phone use behind the wheel and buckle up – any age and any stage.

GDL reduces all teen crashes by 20 – 40%


The best GDL systems save the most lives.



GDL reduces fatal crashes by maximizing experience while minimizing teens' risk.


GDL is just the beginning. Parents make the rule in their homes.



Parents support individual components



Why do parents and teens support GDL

- Parents worry about their kids
- Teens understand
- Minor inconvenience
 - Less than 10% of trips involve more than 1 teen passenger
 - Less than 20% of trips occur after 9 p.m.
- Limits the most dangerous trips

GDL does not = punishment

- Strong GDL isn't a punishment
- Your child's experience with driving is minimal, whether or not he/she is a "good" kid
- Crashes aren't restricted to "bad" kids or reckless drivers
- Not about the teen's personality, GPA, reaction time, responsibility level

All teens are subject to the same underlying risks
